TIPS FROM THE KYOGLE CWA

Here are some of their top tips that help them earn their reputations as queens in the kitchen.

- Always add more golden syrup than the recipe states when making ANZAC biscuits
- Bake cakes at a lower temperature to help it rise evenly and prevent cracks
- When making bread just mix the initial flour ingredients together with the yeast mixture then leave for 5-10mins. This will cut down your 10 min kneading time in half

- Check the freshness of eggs by placing them in a container of water. If it floats, throw it
- Wine is ok at meetings, and you can never have too much cheese



A BLANK ahvas

Local artist Rebecca Tapscott is ready to start her next chapter. After surviving breast cancer and ramping up her art career, she is now realising her dream of having a dedicated art studio in the main street of Kyogle.

Rebecca Tapscott has had a lot of ups and downs over the past few years. She lost her breast to cancer, scaled back her hours as a high school art and maths teacher, and took a shift in her art practice, embracing new materials with a new outlook on art and life. With life one big blank canvas, Bec and her family have decided to purchase one of main streets beautiful Art Deco shop fronts, to turn into her very own art studio.

Rebecca will work from the space (with art showings by appointment) and will also hold workshops and regular art classes for both school-aged children and adults there. Her artworks will be for sale, and student art will also feature. "I am also hoping pop-up exhibitions for other artists that may be interested" Rebecca explains.

"It feel like things are building with my art practice", the creative says, describing how she has been exhibiting for over 20 years. "Recently my art hung at Tweed River Gallery as part of the Border Art Prize and sold that piece. There are more commissions and exhibitions coming, and now with this space - it's a good place to be."

Much of Rebecca's art deals with life and death, a confronting subject made beautiful by her interpretation. Using a cyanotype process (one of the oldest forms of photography) Rebecca takes a 'light imprint' of animals that have been found dead, either on the side of the road, or by natural causes. She then incorporates her line art style upon the print, often placing flowers and plants around the still shape as a memorial. "I feel it gives them another life," she explains. "They leave their energy on the work and I celebrate it with flowers." Earlier this year, Rebecca worked with local indigenous Elder Wayne Walker to create the colourful Recreation Ground mural in Kyogle. The artwork is a melting pot of styles and cultures, combining a magpie (native birds are a favourite subject matter for Rebecca), and Wayne's traditional artwork, featuring animals walking from one waterhole to the other. It also incorporates a boomerang and symbols of the sports played at the grounds. The mural was the first project the pair undertook together, and it was such a great combination they

decided to do more; teaming up with local school children to paint power poles along the main as part of an ongoing town beautification project.

Rebecca will also paint a mural for The Whiddon Group Kyogle (aged care) with

students from the Kyogle Public School this year and prepare for a number of new exhibitions, including a combined showing with fellow Kyogle artist and friend Jill Runciman at the the Roxy Gallery. The new studio should be a colourful canvas in no time.

Behind The Art

Jill Runciman is a photographic and mixedmedia artist living in Kyogle. Her work has been shown at galleries around the region, and she is currently working towards an exhibition at the Roxy Gallery for 2019.

This work is called 'Unravelling' and won a Highly Commended award in the Contemporary Art section at the 2018 Bentley Art Prize.

"The piece was inspired by a dear friend of mine who has been suffering severe depression, spending time in and out of hospital but yet to see any way out of the hole," Jill explains. "Seeing how completely debilitating depression can be was absolutely heartbreaking to see in someone I love. 'Unravelling' is an expression of the internal struggle of mental health and the need to find connections outside of the dark mind."

The process involved doing a cyanotype (sun print) of a digitally altered photo on top of woven paper, with collaged imagery and stitching on top.

Jarrah Dundler talks to Kyogle Culture on how moving back to Kyogle helped him write his critically-acclaimed debut novel, Hey Brother.

Six years ago local author Jarrah Dundler was living in Brisbane with his partner and their two-year-old child, with a second on the way. He had a rewarding job in the community services sector but was keen for a career change.

"I'd started to follow a passion of mine; creative writing. I'd enrolled in a course at the University of Queensland, and was writing short stories and had an idea for a novel. After getting some positive feedback on my work from my uni lecturer I decided I wanted to go further with it, to see if I could maybe even write a novel and get it published. But in order to do this I knew I needed time. And lots of it." In order to find this time Jarrah and his partner, Angie, decided to move from Brisbane back to their hometown of

Kyogle. The lower cost of living meant Jarrah was able to take a break from full-time work to write. This time allowed him to explore the craft and take time to find his writing voice and hone his style. "For that first year or so I was

"For that first year or so I was experimenting a lot, writing in different genres and styles. I wrote kids picture books, dystopian short stories, short film scripts and a magic realism novel. But the writing that was resonating with people – including Booranga, a writers centre in Wagga Wagga that published my first short story – was work that was closer to home for me. It was set in and around the town I grew up in and had now returned to."

During one of Jarrah's writing sessions he found himself drawing on his childhood

again, writing the first scene of what

would become his debut novel Hey Brother – a story about a tough kid from the bush whose life changes when his brother returns from war.

"This character I was writing about, Trysten Black, lived on a property about thirty k's out of town. In my imagination the property looked a bit like one I lived at as a kid. Trysten traveled on a bus to school along a long windy road, a common experience for a lot of kids who live in the bush. And the area around him – the ranges, the farmland, the rivers and creeks – was similar to the land around here."

As well as providing inspiration for the setting of *Hey Brother*, being back in the area also helped open doors to the Australian literary world.

"Being based in Kyogle I was able to apply for the Byron Writers Festival Residential Mentorship program. I got in (with an early writing sample from Hey Brother) and spent a week under the mentorship of author Marele Day, who gave me invaluable feedback on my work. The program also included the opportunity to pitch my work to a publisher at Allen and Unwin," Jarrah explains.

"The publisher showed interest and a couple of years later, once I'd done all I could with my manuscript, I sent it to them for consideration. After a long wait I received an email offer of publication. It was an amazing feeling, a kind of shocked elation – like winning the lotto."

Now, a year after that email, and six years after moving to the area to pursue his dream of writing, Jarrah's novel Hey Brother has just been published. It's already received glowing endorsements from fellow Australian authors Rohan Wilson and Kristina Olsson and was shortlisted for the Australian/Vogel's Literary Award (2017).

For the next couple of months he'll be traveling about promoting the novel. Once all that's done he'll be getting stuck into his next novel, which he's also planning to keep local.

"I've got another on the go. It's looking like it'll be close to home, too – set in and around a region like ours – and because my family and I have really settled back here, it looks like I'll be writing it from the place I call home, too."



Local songwriters and musicians, Kym Watling & Geoffrey Bates, are the perfect example of living creatively. Known as Watling & Bates, the pair work tirelessly at their craft; writing, playing and recording their unique "old-time mountain music". They have also adapted their live performances for music lovers who might not get out to the usual scene; creating the Bow & Curtsy arts health program for the aged care sector.

The duo is well known to Kyogle locals after two and a half years busking at the Kyogle Tidy Towns Farmers Market and appearances at the KMI Hall, Kyogle Bazaar, and local halls and cafes. Their Small Town Tales album, produced and engineered by local musician Thor Phillips, was released early this year.

The duo lives in Unumgar, about 40 km from Kyogle, close to Mt Lindesay and the Queensland border. Unumgar has nothing more than a signpost to signal its existence and while it's a very long drive to the local store, it's location has the unexpected advantage of making travel to outlying areas very achievable. The locality also has a colourful history, inspiring Watling & Bates to write In The Dead Of Night, which tells the story of disappearances in the gold rush days of the 1850s.

Unumgar once was the home of Unumgar Station, one of the early stations on the Richmond River, selected in 1848 by James Glennie. Glennie was instrumental in developing a mail route from Ipswich via Peak Crossing to Unumgar and it was upon this road, now know as the Summerland Way, where travellers went missing. One day Glennie discovered human skeletal remains in three caves near Grevillia, and while it was reported in newspapers in 1860, little else is known. The last person reported to have gone missing prior to the discovery of the caves was an elderly man en route to Unumgar Station in about 1855.

To add to the intrique, Bates had been writing In The Dead Of Night before the duo knew of the area's history. He was inspired to write it after seeing visions of an elderly man in the surrounding mountains who was haunted by malevolent shadow forms.


After a break of some years, the Fairymount Festival is back with a new look and the same great community spirit.

Kyogle is rapidly becoming a destination for mountain bike riders, with a network of trails being carved into the slopes of Boorabee State Forest, just 3km from the town centre. Kyogle Mountain Bike Park is an initiative of Kyogle Mountain Bike Club, a group of dedicated local mountain bike riders that formed with the aim of developing trails in the Kyogle area to provide somewhere for locals to ride. Its members have been working hard over the last two years, and the park now offers over 5kms of publicly accessible, purpose-built mountain bike trails. Tracks like 'Chain Gang' and 'Marble Run' are perfect for beginner and young mountain bike riders, whilst tracks like 'Bog Roll' and 'Downright' offer thrilling descents for more experienced riders. The network of fire trails at the site and great views over the Richmond Valley make the park attractive for walkers and joggers.

According to Club President, Blair Cochran, the benefits of the park development are already being realised. "We set out to build some fun but challenging trails and feedback from local mountain bike riders is that they are really enjoying riding them. It's great to see Kyogle youth using the trails too, as the trails are close to town and accessible without the need for a car. The trails are also attracting riders from outside the local area and we hope the project can benefit the Kyogle economy by bringing additional visitors to town."

The Club is currently planning improvements to the public carpark, and the installation of signage throughout the site and is looking to raise funds to support further development of the park. People wanting to support the project can do so via the Club's GoFundMe campaign at www.gofundme.com/kyogle-mountain-bike-forest
